A P R O C L A M A T I O N, For Difcontinuing the Bounties offered for Seamen, and Landmen, to enter themfelves on Board His Majefty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearingDate the Twentyfecond Day of April laft, offer certain Bounties therein mentioned to all Able

and Ordinary Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service; and alfo to all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five Years, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who fhould, on or before the Thirty-firft Day of this Inftant May, voluntarily enter themfelves to ferve in Our Royal Navy: And whereas We find it no longer neceffary to continue the Armament at Sea; We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publift this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby revoking and annulling Our faid Proclamation of the Twenty-fecond Day of April laft: And We do hereby declare Our Royal Will and Pleafure, That the Payment of the feveral Bounties thereby offered fhall ceafe and determine, from and after the Date hereof.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Sixth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-three, and in the Thirteenth Year of Our Reign.

HIS Day, the Lords being met, a Meffage was fent to the Honourable Houfe of Commons, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorized by Firtue of His Majefly?s Commifion, for declaring His Royal Affent to feveral Acts agreed upon by both Houfes, do defire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable Houfe in the Houfe of Peers, to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commiffion, impowering the Lord Archbithop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An AA to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn.

An Act to allow a Drawback of the Duties of Cuftoms, on the Exportation of Tea to any of His Majefty's Colonies or Plantations in America; to increase the Deposit on Bohea Tea to be sold at the India Company's Sales; and to impower the Commissioners of the Treasury to grant Licenses to the East India Company to export Tea Duty-free.

to export Tea Duty-free. An AA to enable the Right Honourable Sackwille Earl of Thanet to make a Navigable Cut, or Canal, from a Place called the Spring, lying near Skipton Cassle, in the County of York, to join to, and communicate with, the Navigable Canal from Leeds to Liverpool, in a Close, called Hebble End Close, in the Township of Skipton, in the said County of York.

An AR for draining and preferving certain Fen Lands and Low Grounds, lying in the South Level,

Part of the Great Level of the Fens, commonly called Bedford Level, between certain old Rivers, or Drains, called Stoke River and Brandon River, and a certain Level, or Diffrict, called Feltwell New Diffrict, and the Hard Lands of Woodhall, in Helgay, and Helgay, in the Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk.

An AR to enlarge the Powers of Two ARs, made in the Eighth and Eleventh Years of the Reign of His prefent Majefly, for making and maintaining a Naviegable Cut, or Ganal, from the Firth or River of Forth, at or near the Month of the River of Carron, in the County of Stirling, to the Firth or River of Clyde, at or near a Place called Dalmuir Burnfoot, in the County of Dumbarton, and alfo a Collateral Cut from the fame to the City of Glafgow; and for making a Navigable Cut, or Canal of Communication, from the Port and Harbour of Burrowflounnefs, to join the faid Canal at or near the Place where it will fall into the Firth of Forth.

An AA for continuing and enlarging the Terms and Powers of Two AAs made in the Thirty-first Year of His late Majesty, and Ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing several Roads in the Counties of Montgomery, Merioneth, and Salop; and for repairing several other Roads therein mentioned.

An Atl for amending, lighting, and watching, the Highways, or Roads, within the Town, Village, or Chapelry, of Peterscham, in the County of Surrey.

An AEt for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road from the Guide Post, at the West End of the Town of Hampton, over Sunbury Common, to the Town of Staines, in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for enlarging and altering the Terms and Powers of Two feveral Acts, made in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of King George the First, and in the Fifteenth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads leading from the Town of Bromfgrove to the Town of Dudley, in the County of Worcester, and from the faid Town of Bromfgrove to the Town of Birmingham, in the County of Warwick, fo far as the faid Acts relate to the repairing of the faid Road leading from the Town of Bromfgrove to the Town of Dadley.

An All for enlarging and altering the Term and Powers of an All, made in the Twenty-fixth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads leading from the Market House in Stourbridge, and other Roads therein mentiohed, in the Counties of Worcester, Stafford, Salop, and Warwick, respectively.

An AA for more effectually amending feweral Roads leading from the City of Exeter; and for rebuilding or repairing Exe Bridge, and making the Avenues leading thereto more commodious; and for building a Bridge over the River Exe, at or near Countefs Wear; and for amending feveral other Roads therein mentioned.

An AA for repairing and widening the Road, from the North Turnpike Road near Scot Gate, otherwife Sco Gate, in the Town of Stamford, in the County of Lincoln, to Oakham, in the County of Rutland; and from Oakham, through Burley, to a Gate on the North Side of a certain Clofe, in the faid Lordship of Burley, called Booth's Clofe, adjoining to the open Fields of Cottefmore, in the faid County of Rutland.
