A PROCLAMATION.

**W** Hereas the Prince of Orange and his Adherents, who design forthwith to Invade Our Kingdoms, in order thereunto have contrived and framed several Treasonable Papers and Declarations, hoping thereby to Seduce Our People, and (if it were possible,) to corrupt Our Army, a very great Number whereof being Printed; several Persons are sent and employed to disperse the same throughout Our Kingdoms: And although all Persons (as well in Criminal as in other Cases,) are bound to take Notice of the Law at their Peril; yet to the intent that none may think to escape due Punishment, or to excuse themselves when they shall be Detected; by pretending Ignorance of the Nature of their Crime; We are Generously pleased by this Our Royal Proclamation, moved by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to warn and admonish all Our Subjects, of what Degree or Quality soever, that they do not Publish, Disperse, Repeat or Hand about the said Treasonable Papers or Declarations, or any of them, or any other Paper or Papers of such like nature, nor presume to Read, Receive, Conceal or Keep the said Treasonable Papers or Declarations, or any of them, or any other Paper or Papers of such like nature, without Discovering and Revealing the same as speedily as may be, to some of Our Privy Council, or to some of Our Judges, Justices of the Peace, or other Publick Magistrates, upon Peril of being prosecuted according to the utmost Severity of Law.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Second day of November, 1688. In the Fourth Year of Our Reign.

Constantinople, August 31. The Removal of the Court to Adrianople being, as you have been already told, resolved on, the late Sultan Mabomet, his Sons and Brother, and the Sultana Vahde or Queen-Mother, went, the 24th instant, privately out of Town to the Camp, conducted by a Guard of only 200 Bostangees. The 25th the Grand Signior (having performed the usual Ceremonies at the Mosque of Ioub, by making Corban or Sacrifice, which is done by killing Sheep and distributing them among

the Poor, in order to the obtaining prosperous Success of their Voyage, and other Enterprizes,) went out of Town in a Solemn Cavalcade to the Camp near Daout Pachas, a Seraglio of the Grand Signior, a League from hence, about which their Tents are pitch'd; He usually lying at his Palace, and in the Afternoon coming to his Tent: But this Cavalcade had nothing of that Splendor and Magnificence which the former Sultans used to shew on the like Occasions. The Advices we have here from Hungary are so uncertain, that it is hard to know the Truth of what passes on that side. It is reported, that Yeghen Bassa has had a Quarrel with the Budzack Tartars and with Teckelej, about dividing some Plunder they got in the Country by Demir Capee; a considerable Pass on the Danube; That Teckelej is thereupon gone from him with his Party; That the Tartars are removed to Nicopolis; And that Yeghen is come this way as far as Sophia. There are Orders sent from hence to raise the Nesiran (or Arrierbar) to join with him, but this being composed of unexperienced undisciplined People, proves generally a great Burthen to the Country, and of small Benefit to the Publick. It's said likewise, that the Visier will go and Winter at Sophia; But this is supposed to be given out at present only to keep the Minds of the People, and especially of the Soldiery, quiet, till they are got to Adrianople. Omir Bacha, the new Caimacan, entred upon his Office as soon as the Visier left this City. To morrow the Grand Signior sets out from the Camp for Adrianople.

Cadix, Octob. 11. Don Marcho Olaya, who sailed from hence with 7 Men of War the beginning of the last month, to meet the New Spain Fleet that's expected home, is returned into this Port, and is now taking in Men and Provisions for the Relief of Oran. And Vice-Admiral Papachino is going with six Ships to look for the said Fleet. The Marquis de Chasteau Renaud is now in this Bay with six French Men of War. The Galeons are fitting in order to their departure for the West-Indies the beginning of the next Year.

Venice, Octob. 23. The Master of a Vessel arrived from Corjou, from whence he parted the 27th past, reports, That he met off of Casoppo the Gallies of Tuscany returning home from the Siege of Negrepoint; And that one of the Commanders of the said Gallies did inform him, that at their departure from Negrepoint, the Besiegers were advanced to the Ditch of the Place; That they had made three

three large Breaches in the Ramparts, and that so soon as the Mines they were preparing were ready, they would make a general Assault. We have advice from *Dalmatia*, that the *Morlaques* had made an Incurſion into the Province of *Arcegowina*, from whence they had brought back a great deal of Booty. The Duke of *Manitua* arrived here the 20th Inſtant in his return from *Hungary*.

*Warſaw*, Octob. 20. The Letters from *Lemberg* confirm the News of the retreat of the Polish Army from before *Camnic*, and of the Tartars having put a great Convoy of Proviſions into that place. The Provincial Dyets are to meet the 20th of the next month, in order to the chooſing the Deputies that compoſe the General Dyet of this Kingdom, which is to meet at this place the 15th of December. The Troops are ſeparated and gone into their Winter-quarters.

*Vienna*, Octob. 24. We have an Account from *Belgrade*, that General *Caprara*, after having given the neceſſary Orders for the Security of the Conquits on the *Danube* and the *Save*, and ſupplied the Raſcians with Arms and Ammunition, was gone to his Government of *Waradin*. And that they expected every day to hear of ſome Action between General *Heuſter* and *Yeghen Baſſa*, who was about *Niſſa* with a ſmall Body of Horſe and Foot. Prince *Louis of Baden* has Leave to return hither. And the Count *de Piccolomini* (who is made Lieutenant-General,) is to Command in *Bosnia* this Winter. General *Peterani* is returned from the Frontiers of *Valachia* to *Transylvania*, and has put his Troops into Winter-quarters. The Blockade of *Great Waradin* is continued by the Troops under the Command of the Count *de Corbelli*: We hear from thence, that 200 Men of that Garriſon, being ſent to fetch in Proviſions, the Count *de Corbelli* ordered a Detachment of Germans and Huſſars to go and look after them, who meeting the Enemy, and charging them, the Spahis, about 40 in number, preſently fled, and the Imperialiſts purſuing them, took 10 Priſoners, and kill'd 14 or 15; But at their return, they found the Janiſaries had entrenched themſelves within their Wagons; And the Germans beginning the Attack, Count *Sirozzi*, who commanded them, was immediately ſhor dead upon the place, and 2 or 3 Subaltern Officers wounded: This did not diſcourage our Men, who made a ſecond Assault, and were again beaten off; But the Germans and the Hungarians alighting from their Horſes the third time, forced the Enemy after a very obſtinate Defence, they being all cut in pieces, except 23, who were taken Priſoners; Of which number was the Deputy-Governor of *Waradin*. On our ſide, beſides the Officers before-mentioned about 40 were kill'd and wounded. From the Camp commanded by General *Bathiani* near *Canifa* we have advice, That the ſaid General, finding the Turks kept themſelves very cloſe within their Walls and the Coverts of their Gardens, which are not within the City, but joined to it by Bridges, and defended on all ſides by unpaſſable Marſhes, he thought it neceſſary, by ſome Stratagem, to draw out the Garriſon, which he endeavoured to effect after this manner: There is a little Town, (a kind of a Suburb to *Canifa*,) inhabited by Raſcians, and covered on all ſides by theſe Gardens, and ſome little Outworks; General *Bathiani*, with about 4000 of the Militia quartered in that Neighborhood, made, on the 13 Inſtant, an Appearance, of forcing his way into this Town, and in the mean time poſted 1000 Croats between that Place and *Canifa*, with Orders not to ſhew themſelves, till the Body, he imagined would come out of the City to the ſuccor of this place, was paſſed by them: According to Expectation, the Baſſa ſallied out with 1000 Men, but the Croats, impatient to engage, appeared before the Enemy were come up to them, upon which the Baſſa making a ſtand, repulſed the Croats that attack'd him; But General *Bathiani* halting to their Relief, the Turks retired, having had about 100 kill'd and wounded, and among the laſt the Baſſa himſelf, but not dangerously. On our ſide about 10 were kill'd, and 30 wounded. The new

Levies the Emperor has ordered to be made will amount to 20000 Men.

*Hamburgh*, Octob. 29. There has been lately a Meeting of the Electors of *Saxony* and *Brandenburgh*, the Duke of *Hanover*, and the Landgrave of *Heſſe* at *Magedbourg*. The 27th Inſtant arrived here the Baron *Bielke*, who is to command the Suediſh Troops that are to march towards the *Rhine*. The King of *Denmark* has given Orders for the raiſing 2000 Foot and 3000 Horſe to augment his Standing Forces.

*Hamburgh*, Novemb. 3. The *Lunenburgh* Forces are on their march to join with thoſe of *Saxony*, which are marching towards *Francfort*; They will be likewiſe joined by ſome Troops of *Brandenburgh* and *Heſſe Caſſel*.

*Francfort*, Novemb. 4. The French Army commanded by the Dauphin began to march the ſecond Inſtant towards *Manheim*. The Elector of *Saxony* is coming this way with the Confederate Forces.

*Bruiſſels*, Novemb. 9. *Philipsbourg* was ſurrendered the firſt Inſtant, the Governor and Garriſon marching out with Arms and Baggage, and four pieces of Cannon. The Dauphin does now beſiege *Manheim*. And *Monſieur de Boufflers* is before *Coblentz*. The Elector of *Saxony* is arrived with 22000 Men in the Neighborhood of *Francfort*. They write from *Vienna*, that the Troops of *Bavaria*, 10000 ſtrong, were paſſed by that place in their march homeward. And that the Emperor was ſending 12000 Men towards the Empire.

*Paris*, Novemb. 10. On Monday laſt *Te Deum* was ſung here for the taking of *Philipsburg*. There is a report that *Manheim* is likewiſe taken. The Court will return to *Vorſailles* on Friday next.

*Dover*, Novemb. 3. This day between 10 and 11 a Clock, about half Sea over, we diſcovered the Dutch Fleet, which was very numerous; And about 5 this Afternoon they were all paſt by this place, ſteering a Channel-Courſe Weſtward; The Wind at E. N. E. a very freſh Gale.

*Deale*, Novemb. 3. His Majeſties Ship the *Swallow*, Captain *Aylmer* Commander, has brought into the Downs a Flyboat, one of the Tenders of the Dutch Fleet, having on Board four Companies of Foot of Colonel *Babington*'s Regiment commanded by Major *Collambine*. The Prince of *Orange* is with the Fleet, which ſet ſail from *Goree* on *Thursday* laſt in the Afternoon, and is gone Weſtward.
